## Terms and Conditions

1. That The Users shall comply with the Greater Wellington Regional Council, Parks, Forests & Reserves Bylaws 2009. Copies are available at [www.gw.govt.nz](http://www.gw.govt.nz) and every holder of a permit must make themselves familiar with these bylaws.
2. That any damage caused as a result of The Users entry upon the property is to be made good or repaired to the satisfaction of the Manager, Parks or the reasonable costs of making good or repairing the damage will be paid.
3. Restrictions apply:
  - No access to adjoining private land without consent
  - No access to active logging operations
  - Leave all gates as found
  - Keep to formed roads. Do not cut or open new tracks
  - Please walk your horse on grassed areas to avoid damaging the turf – no galloping
  - Please lead your horse through Mangaroa tunnel and the Kaitoke underpass State Highway 2
  - Enter streams and rivers only to cross
  - Give way to all recreational users
  - Give way to any loaded logging trucks
  - This permit is valid for one year and must be renewed annually, at which time there will be an assessment of whether keys issued are still required. Please advise Greater Wellington of any changes to your address.
  - This permit does not allow vehicle access. Horse Riding only
4. That The Users acknowledge the restrictions imposed by Greater Wellington Regional Council if it is undertaking track maintenance, earthworks, and logging or forestry operations on any part of the property. There may also be restrictions imposed by weather conditions.
5. This permit does not entitle the holder to enter any area under control of or in the ownership of The Council already under licence, lease, or permit to any other person nor does it confer a right to access except by way of defined legal roads or rights of way. Permission to cross any private land must be obtained from the owner or occupier.
6. This permit and associated keys are not transferable and must be surrendered on demand to any Warranted Council Officer. It may at any time be cancelled by public notice issued by radio or published in a newspaper or posted on the Council website.
7. In consideration of being given permission to enter on Council land, the permit holder agrees to do so entirely at their own risk. They must take all reasonable steps to protect their own safety.
8. Light no fires. The extent and location of any wild fire is to be reported immediately via the 111 system.

# Hazards that may be Encountered by Horse Riders in the Pakuratahi Forest & Kaitoke Regional Park

Hazards		Suggested Action
<b>Roads and Tracks</b>		
a.	Roads and tracks can be rough in places.	Avoid soft edges, holes and obstructions. If in doubt turn back.
b.	Other park users may be in vehicles, on horses or walkers.	Keep your riding speed low especially on corners. Expect other users at any time especially service vehicles.
c.	Falling debris, washouts, windfalls.	Be aware, conditions may change at any time.
d.	Kaitoke underpass. This is an enclosed space with traffic moving overhead. Horses may become spooked.	See Terms & Conditions point 3
e.	Mangaroa Tunnel. This is an enclosed space & you may encounter other recreational users. Horses may become spooked.	See Terms & Conditions point 3
<b>Topography</b>		
a.	Steep country, slippery and unstable slopes. Bluffs.	Stay on designated tracks. Learn the lie of the land. Dismount if necessary.
b.	Rivers and streams	Avoid river travel.
c.	Forests - high winds may bring down trees or branches.	Do not enter the permitted area on extremely windy days.
<b>Other Users</b>		
a.	Dog walkers, trampers, picnickers etc may be encountered anywhere, even in the most remote areas at any time.	Stay alert to other forest users.
b.	Other horse trekkers and cyclists may use exotic forest areas other than existing tracks. Cyclists may approach rapidly from behind you.	Stay alert to other forest users.
<b>Poisons</b>		
a.	Obey all signage relating to any poisons laid in the area.	
<b>Getting Lost</b>		
a.	Take a cellphone with you and let people know your intentions. If possible never ride alone.
