UNDERWATER DIVING

The Diver's Flag means
SLOW DOWN

To under 5 knots or keep 200 metres distance.



Vessels of any kind engaged in diving operations and whose size makes it impracticable to exhibit the shapes described show the International Code Flag 'A' or a replica thereof.



Divers not operating from a vessel may show the International Code Flag 'A' or a rigid replica thereof displayed from a buoy or a float.

HARBOUR RULES

- 1 There are several navigation lights and beacons in the Harbour entrance which must not be used to tie boats to.
- 2 Do not anchor and fish in the main shipping channel.
- 3 Keep 30m clear of any oil/chemical tankers at Seaview Tanker Berth, Burnham Wharf or Aotea Quay as they could be discharging inflammable cargo.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Wellington Harbour covers an area of 8900ha and has 76kms of accessible coastline stretching from Baring Head in the East to Owhiro Bay in the West. The enclosed nature of the Harbour gives many sheltered beaches and bays regardless of wind direction. The southcoast of the area is exposed to the open sea and provides good diving and fishing areas but access is constrained by weather conditions.

The inner Harbour is large enough to accommodate all aquatic activities without conflict with each having its own area. There are five water-ski-lanes and two dedicated jet-ski lanes, two rowing courses, windsurfing areas and numerous yacht clubs.

Bathing is safe at all beaches except those near the harbour entrance and on the southcoast; Oriental Bay, Petone Beach and Days Bay being the most popular. The summer water temperature averages 15 c with warmer water being experienced in shallower areas such as Petone Beach and Hataitai Beach.

Harbour cruise launches operate on the Harbour, with the TRUSTBANK ferry running a regular service from Queens Wharf to Days Bay and other vessels having lunchtime and evening cruises.

For those who enjoy coastal walks there are two easy walks from Eastbourne to Pencarrow lighthouse approx. three hours return, and Owhiro Bay to Red Rocks where seals congregate from May to September, approximately 2 hours return. Both walks are on level but rocky ground.

There is good fishing within the Harbour, with seasonal catches of Trevali, Snapper and Kawhai. Fishing outside the Harbour is more rewarding with most sea going species available. Surfcasting from the rocks and reclamation inside the Harbour is popular.

Diving is rewarding on the Southcoast with kelp fish, crayfish and paua being in abundance.

The two islands in the Harbour offer sheltered anchorages for small craft. As Somes Island is a quarantine station you are not permitted to land on the island but you can land on Ward Island to picnic and explore.



Extracts from the Water Recreations Regulations 1979.

SPEED OF SMALL CRAFT

No person shall propel or navigate a small craft at a proper speed exceeding 5 knots:

- A within 30 metres of any other vessel, raft or person in the water $\,$
 - B within 200 metres of the shore or of any structure
- C within 200 metres of any vessel or raft that is flying flag A of the International Code of Signals

Every person who propels or navigates a small craft shall, as far as is practicable, do so at such a speed so that waves caused by the movement of the craft through the water do not break against the shore or against any structure.


No person shall propel or navigate a small motor craft at a proper speed exceeding 5 knots while any person is sitting at the fore part of bow of the craft with any portion of their body estending over the fore part, bow or side.

Minimum age for small motor craft operators:

No person under the age of 15 years shall propel or navigate a small motor craft that is capable of a proper speed exceeding 10 knots


NAVIGATION LIGHTS

These are the navigation lights required on most power driven vessels operating on water by night (sunset to sunrise). Refer to regulations for other vessels and the distances from which each light must be visible. Masthead light on power driven vessels of less than 12 metres shall be a minimum height of 0.91 metres above the side lights.



Craft less than 12 m can show an all-round masthead light and side lights.

TO AVOID COLLISION:



Vessel overtaking another. Every overtaking vessel gives way (this includes a sailing vessel).



Power vessels meeting head on. Each alters to starboard.



Power vessels meeting. The vessel having the other on the starboard side gives way.




Power vessel gives way to sailing vessel.

WATER SKIERS

Access Lane Markings


Access Lanes enable motor launches and water skiers to legally leave or approach the shore at speeds in excess of 5 knots. Direction of travel is anticlockwise. All access lane marker poles are coloured orange or orange and black.



Boat operators and skiers to estimate 200 metres from shore if lane buoy not in position.

WATER SKI RULES

- 1 Keep well inside the lanes.
- 2 Enter and leave at right angles to the shore.
- 3 Have an observer to report every mishap to the skiier.
- 4 Do not proceed in a manner dangerous to other persons or vessels in the lane.
- 5 Do not use the lane for any other purposes
