Report from the Chair

Nursery News: The Reeves Nursery has been a real focus for our efforts. Local group members and their out of town visitors have been trooping down the right of way track to view it and to work individually and in teams to prick out and pot up the plants which have been grown from locally sourced seed. Carex, coastal flax and pingao have been our best successes so far. It has been very satisfying to gather seed, propagate and grow on the plants. Some of these plants will be ready for the 2002 planting season. I have a tray of Toi Toi plants – the seeds were collected from the Arcus Dam track – which are coming on well and will eventually replace the pampas at the end of Moana Street. There is a whiteboard at the end of the nursery with a list of tasks needing to be done in order of priority. Anyone prepared to spend a little time there -just go down and work on these tasks, the nursery is not locked.

The larger plants have been moved into the standing out area to make room for the large amount of plants potted on by our volunteers. We could have a problem with a shortage of space in the not too distant future! We have had problems with the timers on the sprinkler system which have stopped functioning. They have been returned to the suppliers and hopefully they will be repaired. Fortunately, it has happened at a time when we are getting plenty of rain

Planting: unfortunately, a short time after our last planting on the riverbank we had an unusually high tide which went over a lot of the plants and deposited driftwood on them. Quite a few have died but, surprisingly; most of the rest look healthy. Weed clearing around the plants needs doing with the spring growth going on at present. A work party is needed to clear the area.

Water Monitoring: The water monitoring still continues with two new additions to the group. The new members reported they enjoyed the experience and are looking forward to future expeditions. Pollution of the Mangapouri Stream is still a prime concern and we are looking forward to a solution soon.

Membership: Our group has grown in number with over 60 individuals on our list at present and others continually showing interest in becoming involved. Please keep mentioning the project to others and recruit new members (so grab the next good looking guy you see by the collar and coerce him gently to join! -Ed)
