A SUSTAINABLE REGION

Sustainability is our goal for the Greater Wellington region. This means meeting people's needs now without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs.

A sustainable Greater Wellington region has:

Efficient use of natural resources

Resources such as land and water are used efficiently and waste is minimised.

Limited pollution

Pollution of air, land and water is limited to levels with which natural systems can cope. The region reduces global pollution, such as greenhouse gas emissions, and limits local pollution.

A diversity of nature

Biodiversity of habitats and species of plants and animals is valued and protected.

Basic needs met

Everyone has access to food, water, housing and heating at reasonable cost.

Needs met locally

Local needs, including those for work, shopping, education and recreation, are met locally where possible, and communities are nurtured.

Satisfying work opportunities

Everyone has the opportunity to undertake satisfying work, both paid and unpaid.

Health

Physical and mental health is protected. Nobody is unhealthy as a result of lack of health care or because of an unhealthy and unsafe living or working environment.

Access

People have access to facilities, services, goods and each other and can move around without unnecessarily compromising a healthy environment. Access for all is achieved through a range of transport options, local and regional services and via telecommunications.

A sustainable economy

The economy prospers within the region's natural and social environment.

Safety

People live without fear of violence, crime or persecution. Everyone feels safe in their daily lives and accepts the risk from natural hazards.

Knowledge

The region values learning, research and innovative science. Everyone has access to skills, knowledge and information.

Empowerment

All sections of the community can participate in decision-making and contribute to our society by having the opportunity to be informed and educated on matters affecting them.

Culture

All cultural values are respected, differences acknowledged and diversity celebrated.

Leisure opportunities

People have access to a range of open spaces, including the coast, the sea and rivers, and have opportunities for leisure, recreational and cultural activities.

A distinctive sense of place

Local distinctiveness and diversity are valued. People identify with their community and have a strong sense of place.
