

SPEAKERS

DON BRUNS

Don Bruns is a State Recreation Planner for the Bureau of Land Management's (BLM) Colorado State Office in Lakewood, Colorado

Don swork in the Beneficial Outcomes Approach to Leisure (BOAL) and Benefits-Based Management (BBM) is helping shift agency recreation practice beyond traditional programme facility, and resource system management to more explicitly address the character of public lands recreation settings and the consequent value which recreation-tourism use adds to the lives of recreation participants as well as non-participating but affected local residents. their communities and economies, and the environment Itself. Working with Dr B.L. Driver, from the U.S Forest Service and Brian Hopkins from the BLM he helps teach BBM training courses tor a variety of audiences including the U.S. Forest Service, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and most recently the Natural Resource Management Training Coalition

Don has also provided benefits-based technical assistance to several outside agencies and organisations. including the University of Minnesota and Minnesota DNR. the University of Colorado. Parks Canada. Arizona State Parks Delaware State Parks and professional recreation organisations

His favourite outdoor recreation pursuits are extended wilderness canoeing and Nordic winter touring.

DR. SPENSER HAVLICK

Dr. Spenser Havlick is a professor of Architecture and Planning at the University of Colorado where he has served as Dean and Assistant Dean

HE was awarded a Fulbright Scholarship to Taiwan $\rm in$ 1990-1991 and has returned there many times to train Taiwan's Environmental Protection Agency staff and carry out his research on natural hazard mitigation Or Havlick has been awarded seven outstanding teaching and service awards.

Dr Havlick has served on the Boulder City Council since 1982. including Deputy Mayor He is a strong advocate for progressive transportation planning. wise growth management and increased public participation in governance.

ROBIN JUDKINS

Robin Judkins is the CEO of Ironman Productions Ltd. Robin created and runs many of the best-known adventure sports in New Zealand including the Fresh-up Iron Man. the Speights Coast to Coast and the Xerox Challenge. He lives in Christchurch with his wife Lorain and their daughters. Lucy and Bonnie.

A manic former alcoholic-turned-event organiser extraordinaire. Judkins first conceived of the race across his country while on a trek across New Zealand's Southern Alps with a few friends After three years of preparation he staged the first race in 1983 Despite a pleasing turnout of 143 starters Judkin's epic event made a loss and after similar losses in the following two years he was on the brink of bankruptcy But award-winning television coverage in 1985 saw a massive Increase in entries in 1986 and the Coast to Coast became a household name in this outdoor-orientated country

Today the event is a multi-million dollar, operation, but for Judkins the role remains the same. Every year he stands at the finish line to greet every finisher with a can of the sponsor's product. "If I'm going to make 1,000 people race across the country" he says, "then the least I can do is meet them at the finish."

DR. CLIVE POPE

Dr. Clive Pope is a Senior Lecturer in the Department of Sport & Leisure Studies at The University of Waikato Following a background in physical education and teaching he completed a PhD in Sport Pedagogy at The Ohio State University. His initial research examined the meaning of sport to urban youth and the educative role of sport in school settings. Clive's teaching focus is on sport and young people at the undergraduate and graduate level and aspects of instruction in sport and leisure settings. His research Interests centre on: sport and youth. youth culture. sport and education affective influences on learning in physical activity. and exploring the sport experience.

Clive is also Interested in the promotion and development of qualitative research as a means of inquiry. His recent research has Included the nature and growth of high school sport academies, sideline behaviour at junior sports events evaluation of the Sportsforce programme and the development of basketball at junior level.

Clive's leisure Interests focus on gardening [especially Japanese maples), reading, music, computers and consuming good coffee and wine
