Wellington Regional Policy Statement – Proposed Change 1 Hearing Stream 4: Urban Development

Hearing Statement on Behalf of Rangitāne o Wairarapa (Submitter 168, Further Submitter 2)

- 1. This is a hearing statement on behalf of Rangitāne o Wairarapa in response to Hearing Stream 4: Urban Development for the Wellington Regional Policy Statement Proposed Change 1.
- 2. Rangitāne o Wairarapa submitted and further submitted on 20 provisions relevant to this hearing stream. In summary, Rangitāne sought the following:
- · That well-functioning urban environments, as they relate to the provision of a variety of homes, include quality (i.e. healthy) as well as affordability and location.
- · That the RPS include policy and methods that provide for the occupation, use, development and ongoing relationship of tangata whenua with their ancestral land.
- \cdot That environmental research explicitly recognises and provides for Mātauranga Māori.
- Opportunity is provided for tangata whenua to build up with their social, cultural, environmental and economic capacity, using mātauranga Māori; by implementing a Kaupapa Māori-based model or framework for urban development that is outcome focused (such as Whanau Ora Outcomes Framework). This has potential to improve both tangata whenua and wider community outcomes.
- · Policies in the RPS relating to appropriate urban expansion and development in rural areas are consistent with the issues covered and include a requirement to consider all matters covered in Section 6(e) of the RMA 1991.

- 3. Rangitāne o Wairarapa supports the recommendations in the Section 42A report relating to the Rangitāne submission and further submission. For completeness, a table of individual submission points and the Rangitāne response to the Section 42A officer's recommendations is appended to this letter.
- 4. I note the comments in the Section 42A report in paragraphs 925-930 relating to whether a definition of ancestral land is necessary or appropriate. Rangitāne o Wairarapa would like to ensure we are actively involved in any discussions regarding this topic with Greater Wellington Regional Council.
- 5. Rangitāne o Wairarapa will not be presenting evidence at Hearing Stream 4 but ask that this letter is tabled for the Hearing Panel's consideration.
