## **5 Belmont Regional Park – Restoration Implementation and Grazing Requirements to 2030 – Report 26.7**

Jack Mace, Director Delivery and David Boone, Manager Ecosystems and Community, spoke to the report.

Moved: Cr Duthie / Cr James

That the Committee:

- 1 Agrees that the proposed restoration of Belmont Regional Park, including grazing, for the four-year period of 2026 to 2030 is consistent with Toitū te Whenua – Parks Network Plan.

2 Provides feedback on the proposed transitional grazing approach to inform officers' consideration and granting of a four-year grazing licence for Belmont Regional Park.

3 Requests:

- a that all interested groups, including Preserve Belmont Farm Park Inc and recreation groups, are engaged in master-planning, and that master-planning includes opportunities for groups to gather, listen to each other and seek common ground
- b that master-planning consider as a key focus area the role of ongoing grazing in Belmont
- c that best-efforts are taken to bring the outcome of master-planning to the Committee for consideration in late 2026 or soon after
- d that the interim grazing license is negotiated on a collaborative basis to both facilitate grazing needs and enhance park values, considering support for reticulated water supply where necessary
- e that staff defer inessential fence removal in retired areas until a spatial plan has been agreed
- f that staff prioritise good neighbour expectations for managing boundary weeds including gorse and reducing wildfire risk
- g that weed control within retired areas of the park is focused on weed species of greatest risk to healthy restoration
- h that staff support the expansion of community-led predator control and support nursery development in the park to increase planting capability.

4 Supports:

- a the restoration priority given to erosion-prone Porirua Harbour catchments in light of Te Waiora o Parirua
- b staff working in partnership with mana whenua and encourage partnership at both governance and management levels

Moved as an amendment (to replace parts 2,3 and 4): Cr Staples / Cr Elder

That the Committee:

2 Notes:

- a That during the Toi Te Whenua public consultation process, for whatever reason, Greater Wellington failed to engage with the group of park users that wish to preserve the majority of the park as grazed farmland
- b That central government and public pressure to minimise rate increases will result in strain on restoration budgets
