



#### Wairarapa Operational Resource Consents





# Approach

- Floodplain management plans provide direction on what river management activities we are doing
- Resource Consents approval to carry out maintenance activities
- Code of Practice guide how the work is performed
- Environmental Monitoring Plans help us to monitor the river systems and the effect of activities



#### **Western Rivers**

- Four western river management consents were notified in February 2017
- Fifty-five submissions were received. We are working with submitters with the aim of avoiding hearings
- To support resource consent applications and ongoing delivery we are developing a Code of Practice and an Environmental Monitoring Plan



#### Wairarapa Consents

- A consent has been submitted for river management activities in the northern Wairarapa rivers and gravel management for the whole valley.
- This application remains on hold until the Te Kauru and Waiohine FMP's are substantially completed



#### Barrage Gates Operation



- Planning work is also underway to prepare a resource consent application for the Geoffrey Blundell Barrage Gates which expire in 2019
- A project team has been formed to develop a consenting strategy
- Operational consents for the LWVDS expire in 2027
