Transport-related greenhouse gas emissions will fall significantly, while providing a more sustainable, inclusive, safe and accessible transport system for all New Zealanders.



# Vehicle safety ratings

- The latest (2022) safety ratings for all used light vehicles in Aotearoa are now on www.rightcar.govt.nz
- Information about crash avoidance features in imported used light vehicles has been added too (previously only available for NZ-new vehicles).
- People are twice as likely to survive in a 5-star safety rated vehicle than in a one or two-star vehicle.

# **VKT Reduction Planning**

#### **Key Milestones**

- Jun 23 National VKT Reduction Plan (Waka Kotahi)
- Jun 23 VKT reduction sub-national targets confirmed (Te Manatū Waka)
- Dec 23 Urban VKT Reduction Programmes (Tier 1)
- Dec 24 Urban VKT Reduction Programmes (Tier 2)

VKT reduction programmes and activities should be included in the next round of RLTPs where possible, so that they can attract funding from multiple sources from mid 2024. Waka Kotahi will provide a recommendation on targeted activities for inclusion in RLTPs by Aug 2023.

- Most activity will be on SH1 and SH2 in the metro areas, as well as SH59
- Remutaka Hill will also have its annual maintenance programme of overnight closures

# SH1: **Ö2NL** safety improvements and speed

Safety improvements and speed reviews on existing highways are progressing in parallel with the new highway

- SH57: SH57/ Queen St roundabout, stretches of edge barrier and wide centre lines on SH57, and speed review
  - Safety improvement work from SH1 to a new round roundabout at Queen St East are completed
  - In addition to the wide centreline, wide shoulders of 2.5m have been provided opposite driveway entrances where space and underground services allow
  - New speed limits implemented in December: 80km/h from SH1 to Heatherlea East Rd; 60km/h at southern entrance to Shannon
  - November's Interim Speed Management Plan consultation proposed 90km/h on SH57 from Heatherlea East Road to Shannon; new speed limits around 5 Horowhenua schools were included.
- SH1 Ōtaki to Ohau: Stretches of side and median barrier, wide centrelines and turnarounds, and speed review
  - Work is expected to begin early this year. Letters to property owners in the area have provided an update on the project
  - New speed limits implemented in December: 80km/h stretches from Pukehau overbridge to Ohau.
- SH1 Levin to Foxton: Stretches of wide centrelines, side and median barriers, turnaround plus a new roundabout at Waitarere Beach Rd, and speed review
  - Following ongoing community engagement, design being completed early this year.

## SH1: **Ō2NL new highway**



#### local hapū of Ngāti Raukawa ki te Tonga

NZ Upgrade Programme-funded 24km four-lane new highway to improve safety and resilience in the Ōtaki to north of Levin transport corridor. Waka Kotahi, Muaūpoko Tribal Authority and local hapū of Ngāti Raukawa ki te Tonga working in partnership to deliver the project

#### Notices of Requirement and RMA consents lodged

- Notices of Requirement (NoR) and resource consent applications were lodged with councils in November, and were notified by them on 24 January; submissions close 28 February
- Request for the applications to be directly referred to the Environment Court has been granted
- Ō2NL project speaker event and series of drop-in sessions held in January / February
- Construction start programmed for 2025, completion for 2029
- Revocation of state highways in project area
  - Programme business case supported by Horowhenua and Kāpiti Coast District Councils
  - Next step is developing the Integrated Working Group
  - As with all new infrastructure, suitability of tolling is being considered

Peka Peka to Ōtaki (PP2Ō) Expressway	\$410m	Road open; other project tasks now being carried out	Amber	<ul> <li>The Peka Peka to Ōtaki Expressway successfully opened to traffic two days before Christmas.</li> <li>An iwi blessing and an official opening took place on 21 Dec, just prior to commencing the opening process for the expressway.</li> <li>The focus is now on other outstanding works for the project, including: <ul> <li>tie-in works at both ends of the expressway and to the network of local roads</li> <li>the shared path for walkers, cyclists and equestrians</li> <li>painting of the Ōtaki Pink carnation, featuring the handprints of local students, within the shared path underpass</li> <li>landscaping works around the gateway sculptures at either end of Ōtaki</li> <li>destination signage to encourage motorists to stop over in the town.</li> </ul> </li> <li>Gateway sculptures at each end of Ōtaki - designed to attract attention to the township, encouraging people to exit the expressway to visit - have now been installed. The sculptures were blessed and officially opened on 17 February.</li> </ul>

Transmission Gully	c.\$1.25b	Road opening: <b>completed</b> Project completion tbc	Amber	<ul> <li>Transmission Gully continues to be very well utilised by the travelling public, with an average traffic volume of around 23,000 vehicles per day, compared with around 6,000 vehicles per day on SH59 at Pukerua Bay.</li> <li>Transmission Gully's benefit for network resilience was very evident recently, when SH59 was closed for a number of weeks after a large slip at Pukerua Bay. Traffic flowed efficiently on Transmission Gully and around the network despite the closure of SH59.</li> <li>Progress on the Builder's tasks linked to Works (Construction) Completion continues to be slow, with a considerable amount of work remaining to be completed.</li> </ul>






#### NZ Upgrade Programme – SH2: Melling Transport Improvements

(Component of wider Te Awa Kairangi/RiverLink programme)

Grade-separated Melling interchange, new river bridge, new cycling and pedestrian bridge, improved links for cycling/walking modes, and relocated Melling station.

- Alliance procurement process in on track, with evaluations and short listing taking place over the month of February. We expect to achieve a key milestone by confirming a preferred proponent by the end of March 2023.
- Once a preferred proponent is chosen we expect to conclude and sign an Interim Project Alliance Agreement (IPAA) by mid-April 2023. Early works are set to begin mid 2023, with the main contract works starting late 2023.
- First tranche of 70 vacant possession notices for properties on Pharazyn Street concluded positively on 31<sup>st</sup> January, with all tenants finding alternative accommodation.
- Second tranche of 20 vacant possession notices for properties in Marsden Street is underway, to be vacated by 30 April.
- Site investigations continue with noise and vibration testing during February at key locations around the project area to inform construction planning.


